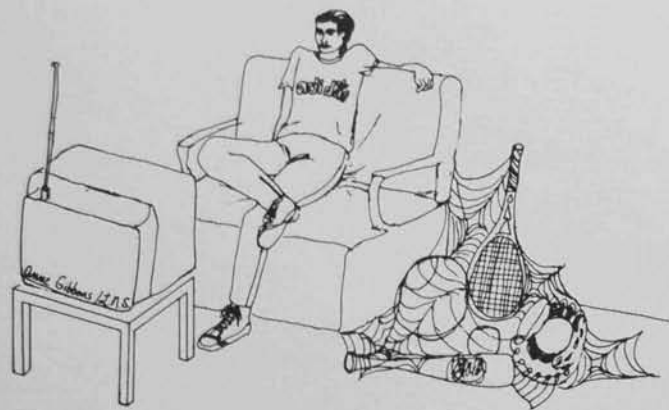

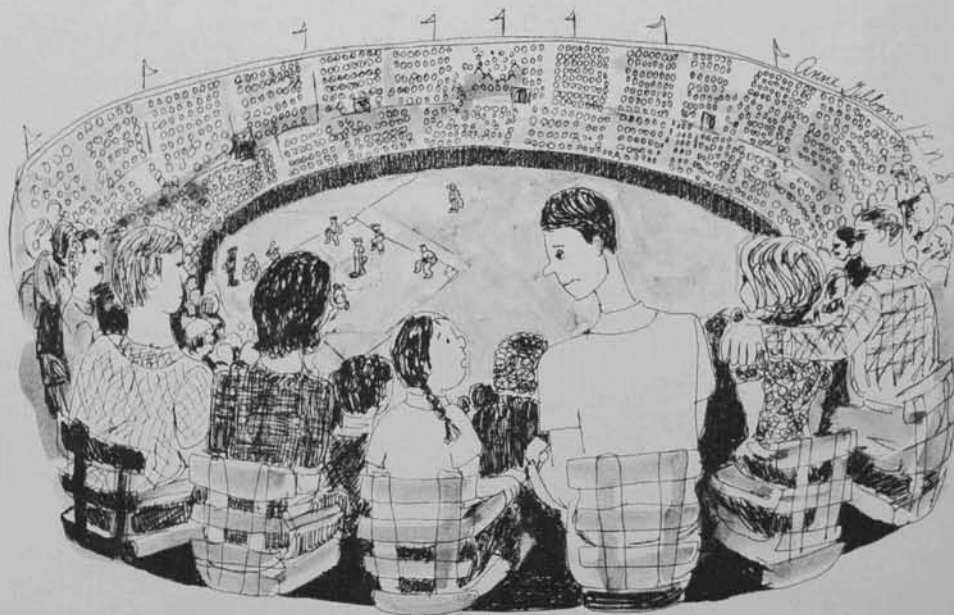

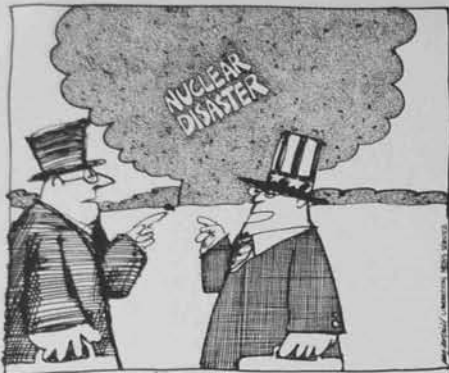

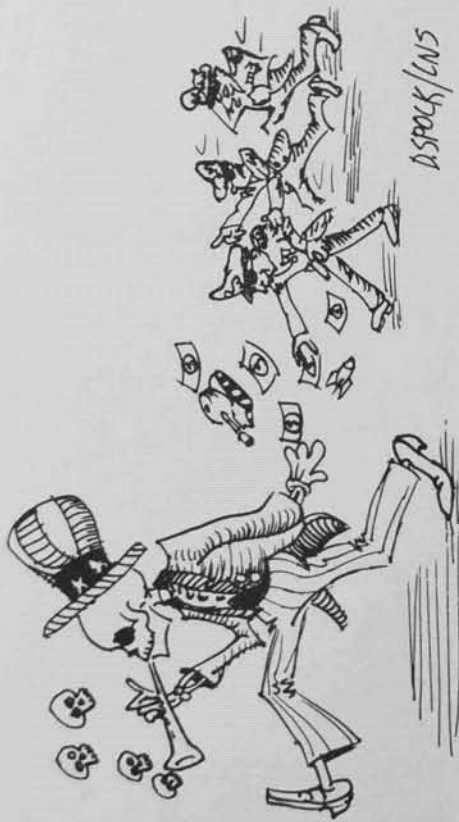

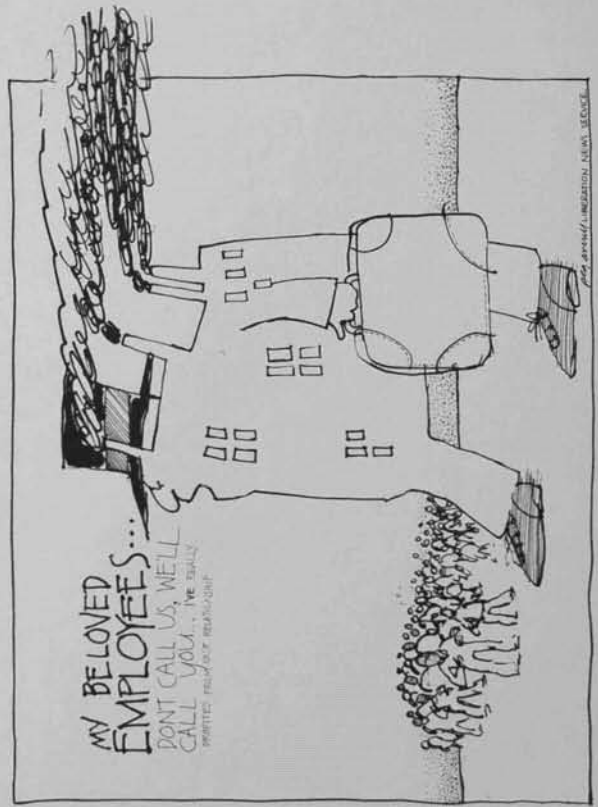

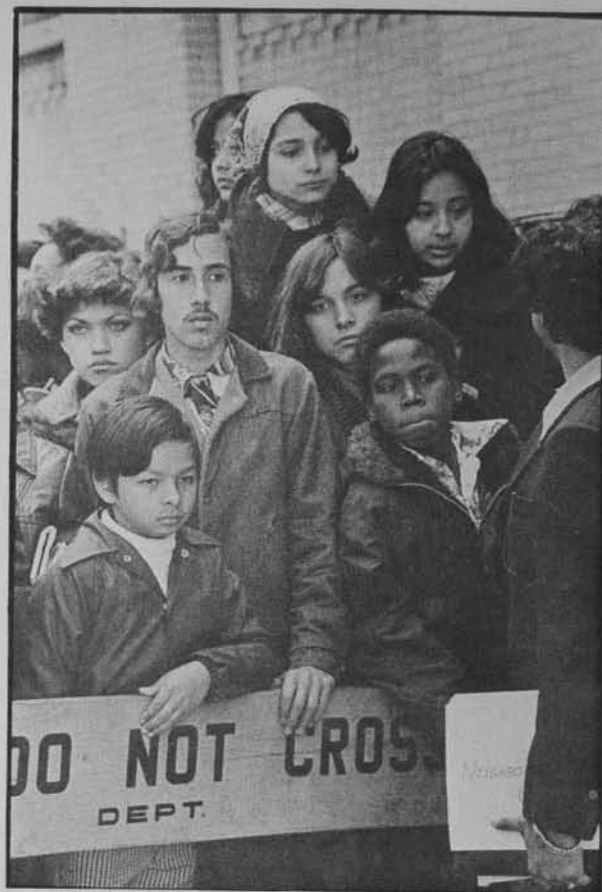

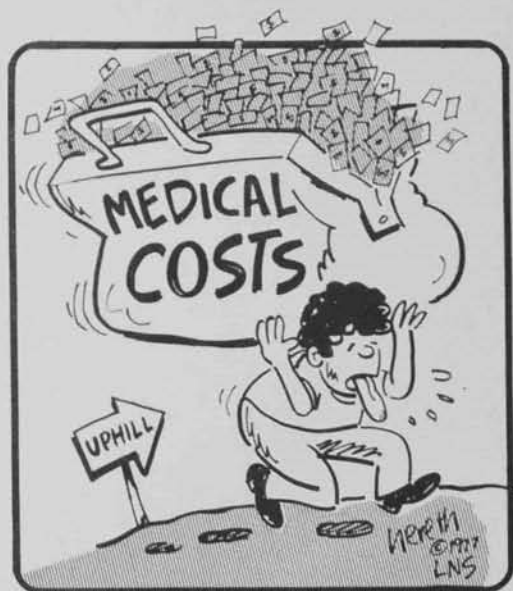
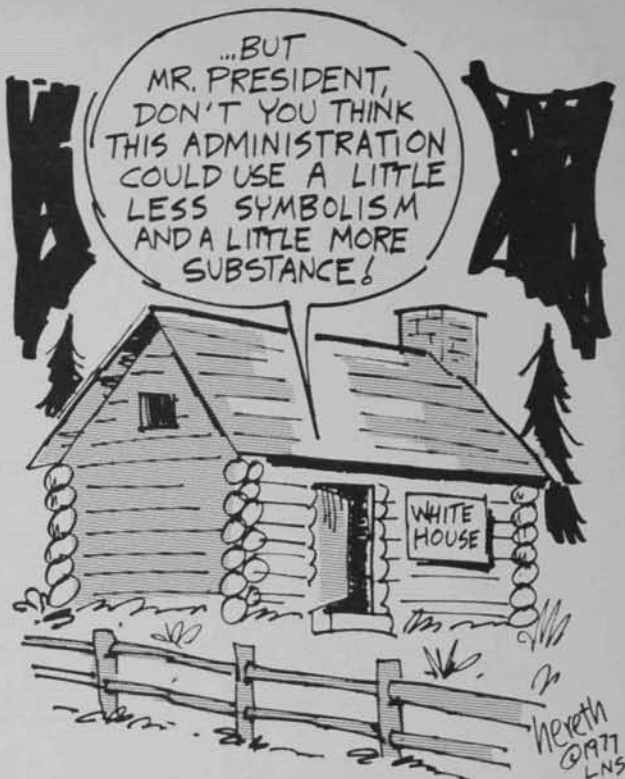

May 26, 1974

150 Milwaukee steelworkers picket union president I.W. Abel for signing the No Strike Agreement.

Women weavers in Pawtucket, R.I. join first joint strike of men and women workers in the US.

June 1, 1905

Polish spool women in Chicopee, Massachusetts strike against speed ups and resist Central Labor Union mediation by conducting their own negotiations through an interpreter, and win!

HARRIET TUBMAN leads raid of black Union troops freeing 750 slaves.

People's History June 13-14, 1638

"You have stepped out of your place. You have rather been a husband than a wife, and a preacher than a hearer, a magistrate than a subject."

Governor Winthrop bans Anne Hutchinson from the Massachusetts Bay Colony, making her the first certifiable uppity woman in the "New World." Others followed.

DAVID WALKER, a free black man, is murdered shortly after his pamphlet appears calling for the abolition of slavery, it was titled "An Appeal to the Colored Citizens of the World."
